## HEACOCK'S

THE story of the founding and the development of the H. E. Heacock Co. Department Store is one that has all the elements of romantic fiction, including as it does, interesting personalities, fire, earthquake, and most important of all, growth and progress despite all sorts of obstacles. The old maxim about truth being stranger than fiction certainly holds here.

To start at the very beginning when Manila's largest department store was but a glitter in the founders' eyes, two gentlemen named H. E. Heacock and B. W. Freer decided in 1900 that what Manila needed more than anything else was a jewelry store. So they opened a shop in the old McCullough Building close by to the Santa Crux Bridge. It was a retail and wholesale establishment dealing in Elgin Watches, International Silver, Rogers Flatware, Gorham's Silverware and other lines of jewelry and silverware ma-nufactured in the U. S. and calculated to give the ladies and gentlemen of Manila a glimpse of some of

the finer things of life

They made a success of it and after a few years moved to the then brand new Lack & Davis Building on Echague. In 1909 another move was made to the Escolta and the firm reconditioned an old Spanish building between Calle Pinpin and Calle David on the north side of the street. In the reconditioning of that building, they put in the first entire glass front store ever put in Manila. This amend and chagrined the other merchants in town, for at that time all the other stores had iron shutters which were closed at 6 o'clock each night. As Mr. Gaches recalled it, "We never had


each night. As Mr. Unenes recently,
a glass front broken by man or benst?!

It was in 1910 that Mr. Gaches entered the picture as it were. A progressive young American born in Leconner, Washington, of a fine pioneer family, he had come to the Philippines in 1900 with the Military Postal Service. In 1901 he became superintendent of Money Orders for the Philippine Islands and in 1905 left the Department of Posts to become Chief Agent of Internal Revenue, Five years later he left the government service to go into business, A Philippine cor-poration was formed in 1910 with Mr. Gaches as Treasurer, which took over all the assets of Hencock

"Obtaining the consent of Dr. Burke to put up a 4-story building on the corner of David and Escolta, this building was constructed under our direction", Mr. Gaches stated. "This store too, had a glass front on the Escolta and also on Calle David. It was considered the most modern store ever seen in Manila. It compared favorably with C. D. Peacock & Co. of Chicago, Gorbam Co. of New York and, although smaller in size, with Caldwell & Co. of Philadelphia.

'At that time free trade relations were entered into between the United States and the Philippines and we built in anticipation of increased business due to the free flow of goods; the increase in population and the improvement in shipping throughout the Islands began at that time, Conditions justified our

vid. We opened whosesale and retau branches in Hoilo, Cebu, and Davao, and a little later in Baguio.
"To continue the history of our building, this
seven-story structure was destroyed by earthquake
in 1937. Nothing daunted, we immediately began looking for new quarters and, dividing up our different departments, obtained space at Nos. 108, 72, and 17 on Escolta. We established our general offices on the 2nd floor at No. 75 Escolta. These four premises not being sufficient to accommodate our business, we moved our Radio, Refrigeration and Office Equipment Departments to our warehouses in Port Area, corner 16th and Atlanta Streets. We reconditioned these warehouses completely and made salesrooms on the ground floor facing 16th St. These reconditioned offices are the very finest in this entire section of the city."

Construction of the new seven-story Heacock Building on the Escolta was begun in May, 1938, It will be the most beautiful building, outside and in-side, of its size, under the American flag.

Its interior is finished in the finest of Philippine woods, Dao wood being used throughout the en-tire store. All railings and trim are of aluminum. The doors are automatic, being photo-electrically operated. Four floors of the building and the basement are air-conditioned, the remaining upper three floors are light, airy and cool, eatching the ocean breezes that constantly blow over Manila. The four upper ficors of the building are for rent, and the offices there are modern and desirable in every way. Three of the latest and fastest Otis elevators in Manila service the building

nila service the building.
"Some of the important dates in connection with "Some of the important dates in connection wan the growth, changes and events of our company are these: In 1919 we took over the entire business of C. Alkan, Dennison & Company, and later the office equipment department of the Manila Trading & Sup-ply Co. In March, 1924 a disastrous fire swept our building and destroyed 7500,000.00 worth of merchan-dise. Fortunately no one was hurt. Undeterred by dise. Fortunately no one was hurt. Undeterred by this disaster, we took on the Philoo Radios and the Frigidaire line. And then there was that earthquake. Even this has not stopped our advance. We grow



"We have with us today a number of employees who have been with us for 30 years or more; among them are F. L. Schleipen, vice-president of the company; J. Manahan, manager of the jewelry manufacturing department; and F. R. Guzman, accountant."
